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The Challenge of Pope Francis

Any who have entered my office know it to be a mess—a constrained mess, but a mess nonetheless. I have tried to make the best of it by framing its condition in terms of ministry. I know I have succeeded when I hear visitors murmuring, "And I thought my office was messy."

Pope Francis's journeys and words in Brazil for World Youth Day reminded me of my office. He recognized mess, in a manner of speaking, and found something redeeming in it.

This came to me most powerfully in his addresses to the leadership of the Latin American Episcopal Conferences and to the Brazilian bishops.

In remarks to the Latin American bishops, Pope Francis spoke of the Church in terms of mysterium lunae, the mystery of the moon. Cardinal Bergoglio explained this just prior to his election as pope by quoting St. Ambrose, "the Church shines not with its own light, but with that of Christ."

Betty Montgomery, Ph.D. (1948-2013)

Bernard Cooke, Th.D. (1922-2013

The LIM faculty and staff remember with gratitude and celebrate the life of Dr. Bernard J. Cooke who was born into eternal life on 31 May 2013. Dr. Cooke, an internationally renowned theologian, author, and lecturer, was born 31 May 1922 in Norway, Michigan, and passed away on his ninety-first birthday at the Village at Incarnate Word in San Antonio, Texas.



Dr. Cooke for over 30 years had been a visiting professor at the Institute for Ministry. He most recently taught at Loyola in the 2009 summer semester. He authored the course text used in the LIM Extension course Church, Sacraments, and

Ministry. He was a beloved teacher and friend to LIM students, faculty, and staff. He is survived by his wife, Dr. Pauline Turner, and daughter, Kelly Turner-Cooke, his brothers David Cooke (wife Leann) of Elk Grove, CA, Tom Cooke (wife Margaret) of Oakland, CA, as well as many nieces and nephews.


been translated into English before.

led by Cardinal Bergoglio in 2007 at] Aparecida wanted a Church that is ... more a facilitator of faith than an inspector of faith.

One other noteworthy characteristic of the moon (and this brings me back to my office)—not only does it not sustain life nor produce light, it is, with its pockmarked surface and bereft of an atmosphere, itself a mess. For Pope Francis messiness, in the sense of diversity and in other ways, can be redemptive.

In fact, he rejects homogeneity, "The Church is never uniformity, but diversities harmonized in unity." He appreciates that most syncretistic of faith practices— "popular piety." Six of the questions he poses to bishops about the state of the church today touch on that most diverse of groupsthe laity. He asks whether they are sharers in the Church's mission, whether they are habitually involved in pastoral discernment at the parish and diocesan levels, and whether Church leaders are conscious of and convinced about their mission and their need of freedom to discern it. He asks. "Do we support them and accompany them, overcoming the temptation to manipulate them or infantilize them? Are we constantly open to letting ourselves be challenged [by them]?"

In remarks to priests at this year's Chrism mass at St. Peter's, he uses the imagery of odor to gesture toward the messiness of involvement in people's lives in the real world. Those priests

who do not go out of themselves, instead of being mediators, gradually become intermediaries, managers. ... [When a priest] doesn't put his own skin and his own heart on the line, he never hears a warm, heartfelt word of thanks. This is precisely the reason for the dissatisfaction of some, who end up sad-sad priests-in some sense becoming collectors of antiques or novelties, instead of being shepherds living with "the odor of the sheep." This I ask you: be shepherds, with the "odor of the sheep," make it real, as shepherds among your flock.

Finally, he urges his listeners to immerse themselves in that most unruly of dimensions—time, in particular, the present. "Every utopian (future-oriented) or restorationist (past-oriented) impulse is spiritually unhealthy. God is real and he shows himself in the 'today.' ... The 'today' is closest to eternity; even more, the 'today' is a flash of eternity. In the 'today,' eternal life is in play."

For Francis, it seems clear that, like the moon, the Church is itself messy. Its members are diverse and their lives complicated; it finds itself confronted by the always-new present. And yet God chose to associate in time with such as these. Christ pitched his tent among the very same.

Instead of lamenting society's downfall, he urges the Church on. By grace, the Church in its messiness nonetheless lives and reflects God's bountiful and merciful love. By grace, it points to the "revolution of tenderness' brought by the incarnation" and "make[s] room for God's mystery... in such a way that it can entice people, attract them" today.

Pope Francis directs these challenges to audiences of the ordained.

Yet the same challenges apply to LIM, our students, graduates, faculty and staff, liaisons, facilitators, and friends. So, how will we respond?
