I was in a LIM meeting. Professor Daniella Zsupan-Jerome was monitoring her iPad and, seeing the white smoke, beat the Cardinal Proto-Deacon to the punchline, "Habemus Papam!" I couldn't access the proceedings on my computer, and so I sought out a spot in front of a TV in Loyola's Communications building. Class let out as the new pope appeared on St. Peter's balcony, and we greeted him with pleased responses, "A Jesuit," "a South American."

# Pope Francis, S.J. continued

I was also moved by his predecessor's decision to step down. It reflected a vulnerability, an admission that he could not do what needs to be done. True. this was not entirely unprecedented; others have chosen this option. Almost 600 years ago, Gregory XII stepped down to heal church division caused by several pretenders to the cathedra of St. Peter. And yet, it has been 600 years, and Benedict XVI's decision has raised questions (what will he wear, do, be called; what impact will his presence in the Vatican have on his successor) that can only be answered in the doing. Another question: what else that was before practically unthinkable might now become thinkable?

In some ways, the election of the current pope was unthinkable—a South American, a Francis. He has already accentuated simplicity, humility, God's mercy, and concern for creation. Also almost unthinkable is that he's a Jesuit. Who'd have thought? LIM faculty have appeared on television and radio some dozen times to offer commentary on Pope Benedict's decision to resign and the election of Pope Francis (see for example <a href="http://goo.gl/E4yeG">http://goo.gl/E4yeG</a> and <a href="http://goo.gl/E4yeG">http://goo.gl/E4yeG</a> and

I will continue to look for evidence of this in his papacy, but I note three things now. First, Pope Francis has linked himself very intentionally to St. Ignatius Loyola the founder of his order who celebrated his first mass upon being ordained a priest at the Basilica of St. Mary Major in Rome. This was also the church Pope Francis visited the first morning of his pontificate.

Second, a central theme in the spiritual exercises of St. Ignatius is indifference and, its opposite, attachment. This is how our former colleague Jesuit Fr.

Jerry Fagin spoke of indifference and attachment in the Ignatian spirituality formation program that he wrote during the "Katrina semester," fall 2005:

The better word for indifference is freedom. We need to be free. There are many things that capture our heart. Many things that can keep us from being free enough to hear God's call in our life. We say to God we are willing to do anything but this one thing. "God I will do anything as long as I don't have to let go of this. God, I will go anywhere in the world for you as long as I don't have to move out of this city." That is what Ignatius would call an attachment. That is something my heart is wrapped around and something that is wrapped around my heart.

So, indifference asks whether "something is going to bring me closer to God or not bring me closer to God." It is a freedom for "God and God's plan that embraces everything we do."

In this sense, I am struck by the freedom of Pope Francis—the freedom to bow in humility before his flock, the people of the Church of Rome, and request their blessing; the freedom to highlight poverty and injustice, wear simple clothes, live in a Vatican guesthouse room instead of in the Apostolic Palace, as Cardinal to criticize an inward-looking church and "hypocritical neo-clericalism," and, finally, the freedom to fail and admit mistakes.

On the latter a Claretian friend of his, Father Gustavo Larrazábal in an interview with U.S. Catholic, quotes the former Cardinal Bergoglio on his time as Jesuit Provincial during Argentina's "Dirty War" in the 1970s, "I swear Gustavo, that I did what I could and what was within my reach. I was totally inexperienced and certainly made many mistakes as a provincial. But I did what I know how to do and what I could." I can't help

but think that the early emphasis of his papacy on divine mercy reflects the recognition of his own need for mercy.

Third, Jerry alerted me to another emphasis in Ignatian spirituality—the goodness of creation—and he framed this insight in terms of gratitude. The worst sin for St. Ignatius was ingratitude because all creation can be seen as gift, as means of glorifying God and loving God and neighbor. The only proper response is one of gratitude. So Pope Francis's regular highlighting of the importance of creation reflects not only St. Francis of Assisi's prizing of nature but also St. Ignatius's.

Thus Pope Francis has already manifested his Ignatian commitments, and I will remain on the lookout for more. Beyond that, I'm sure Pope Francis is a complex figure and will challenge people across the political and theological spectrum. I look forward to watching as his papacy unfolds and will keep him and the Church in prayer as it does.
