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Message from the Director: Christmas Grace

If you'll indulge me, I want to share with you one storyline from one of my favorite films that I recently learned is also one of Pope Francis's favorites. For me, it captures Catholicism in its particularity and universality, in its commitment to materiality and spirituality.

Babette's Feast is based on a short story, the source of the quotes below, by Danish author Karen Blixen (pen name Isak Dinesen) who also wrote *Out of Africa*, both of which were turned into Academy Award winning films.

Babette's Feast portrays a great 19th-century chef exiled from Paris to rural Denmark who works for a pair of single sisters—Martine and Philippa. Without pay, Babette

cooks and cleans for the sisters and serves the local poor. She also purchases a lottery ticket from France annually. Twelve years after her arrival in Jutland, she wins the lottery and proposes spending the



proceeds on a feast in honor of the two women's father who had founded the austere, dwindling,

and increasingly elderly faith community that the sisters maintain in his memory.

By chance the eldest invitee was hosting a visitor, her nephew—a great general—who is also invited to attend. As a young and profligate officer, he had been banished thirty years earlier to his aunt's in Jutland "where he would have time to meditate and better his ways." A dashing and superior figure, he was smitten by Martine and, in order to court her, began to attend her father's church. Her father disapproved of marriage; she spurned its offer, and so he left and resolved "to cut a brilliant figure in a brilliant world."

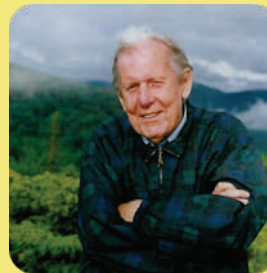

Celebrating the 100th Anniversary of Thomas Berry's Birth

The Loyola Institute for Ministry joins in honoring Thomas Berry's 100th birthday. Thomas Berry, C.P. (November 9, 1914 – June 1, 2009) was a Catholic priest of the Passionist order, cosmologist, and geologist. A cultural historian, Berry believed that the stories which try to explain the origin of the universe are contained in the Cosmos Story and that none of them is at odds with it. He proposed that a deep understanding of the history and functioning of the evolving universe is a necessary inspiration and guide for our own effective functioning as individuals and as a species. He was awarded eight honorary doctorate degrees in his lifetime and recog-

nized all over the world for bringing into consciousness a new vision of the human-earth relationship. A prolific author, he inspired the creation of over 100 organizations in the United States and beyond.

The LIM program in both its curriculum and methodology honors Berry's understanding that the "universe is a communion of subjects, not a collection of objects." To read LIM emerita faculty member Kathleen O'Gorman's reflections about Berry's leg-

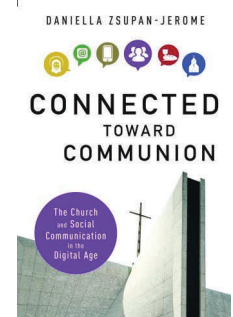

First Groups Begin the Revised LIMEX Program, LIM-Flex

In the spring, LIM announced as one of the fruits of its strategic planning a new LIMEX curriculum and new ways of accessing it, called LIM-Flex. These new options deliver the same quality, transformative education within an adult learning community that engages in contextual and transformative theological reflection and action with a Loyola-certified facilitator. Our first groups began the new program this fall.

The new options increase the number of electives for the master's by eliminating Course 7, *Faith and Culture*, and Course 8, *Faith Development and Spiritu-*

ality, as required. The contexts that these courses address, as well as our model of theological reflection, will be integrated more intentionally into core theological courses, focus courses, and electives. The new options also allow for groups to choose taking between 1 and 6 courses in the LIMEX format and completing the rest online. Students who want to take one course at a time can still do so, but those who want to finish more quickly could take online courses concurrently with LIMEX courses and complete a degree in two years.

Of course, groups are still able to take all 12 courses in the LIMEX format if they choose to do so.

LIMFLEX includes "both the new and the old" (Matthew 13:52), new options along with the same quality education to transform participants.

Message from the Director continued

Despite his success and prestige, he had always wondered, “What if...” And his return to Jutland would give him the opportunity to prove the correctness of his decision to leave.

He anticipated “the low rooms, the haddock, and the glass of water” and that he would dominate the dinner conversation among his simple hosts. What he got astonished him. The food and wine reminded him of the finest restaurant in Paris whose chef was “most surprisingly—a woman!” She turned meals “into a love affair ... in which one no longer distinguishes between bodily and spiritual appetite or satiety!”

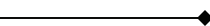
He was so moved by the food and drink that he stood and spoke as if spontaneously. Humans, he said, are

frail and foolish. We have all of us been told that grace is to be found in the universe. But in our human foolishness and short-sightedness we imagine divine grace to be finite. For this reason we tremble. ... We tremble before making our choice in life, and, after having made it, again tremble in fear of having chosen wrong. But the moment comes when our eyes are opened, and we see and realize that grace is infinite. Grace, my friends, demands nothing from us but that we shall await it with confidence and acknowledge it in gratitude. Grace ... makes no conditions and singles out none of us in particular; grace takes us all to its bosom and proclaims general amnesty. See!

that which we have chosen is given us, and that which we have refused is, also and at the same time, granted us. Ay, that which we have rejected is poured upon us abundantly. For mercy and truth have met together and righteousness and bliss have kissed one another!

As he anticipated, the general did dominate conversation, but out of surprise and wonder, not superiority. In retrospect, his dining companions

realized that the infinite grace of which General Loewenheim had spoken had been allotted to them, and they did not even wonder at the fact, for it had been but the fulfillment of an ever-present hope. The vain illusions of this earth had dissolved before their eyes like smoke, and they had seen the universe as it really is. They had been given one hour of the millennium.



An Advent Prayer

May this season of sacred anticipation be one of growing awareness that we are all at every moment drenched in grace. May meals nourish not only physically but also spiritually and so prompt conversation, joy, and reconciliation. May they build community.

Yet not all have a place at the table. Therefore, may this season of fervent hope also be one of growing confidence that all humans, indeed, all creation share in God's abundant grace. May meals also strengthen commitment to

solidarity with all creation.

May the simple meal prayer uttered at the beginning of Babette's feast find some resonance in your lives:

May my food my body maintain,
May my body my soul sustain,
May my soul in deed and word,
Give thanks in all things to the Lord.
